Course Description:

Nonprofit organizations are an important component of American society. Understanding the concepts and functions of nonprofit organizations and nonprofit management provides a unique perspective for understanding society.

This course is designed for undergraduate students who are interested in gaining a better understanding of nonprofit organizations (NPOs) and management. This course aims to provide a foundation of knowledge for students about NPOs and the important roles they play in society. The course will familiarize students with the issues, knowledge, skills, theories, and values relevant to NPOs and NPO management. Students will be provided a general overview of the nonprofit sector as well as the general purpose and functions of nonprofit organizations. Critical components to nonprofit management will also be discussed, including strategic planning and

ethics. A primary goal of this course is to foster critical thinking by applying concepts from the course readings to practical skills.

Course Objectives:

The objectives of this course are to:

- Provide a general understanding of and familiarize students with basic concepts related to the nonprofit sector, nonprofit organizations, and management, as well as philanthropy and civil society.
- Develop a foundation of knowledge about nonprofit organizations and management that students can build on as scholars and in her/his/their careers.
- Provide an awareness of the role and importance of nonprofit organizations in society.
- Provide a general understanding of some of the key theories and practices that drive and influence nonprofit organizations and nonprofit management, and to link these theories to the practice of nonprofit management (apply theories to real life problems).
- Develop a well-rounded understanding of what nonprofits are, their purpose, their aims, how they function.
- Encourage critical thinking about the status of the nonprofit sector and of nonprofit management theories.
- Provide an opportunity for personal, academic, and professional growth.

Program Learning Outcomes:

Students are expected to have the knowledge base for higher-level EMA courses and be ready for analytic, critical, and philosophical discussions in the program.

Course Requirements:

Discussion Questions (30%)

This course is structured around weekly tasks that involve reading a chapter of the textbook, viewing the lectures, and participating in ten (10) discussions with your classmates in the expectation your workload will remain relatively constant throughout the semester. Each week's materials will be posted on WTClass at the beginning of the week.

There are 10 discussion board questions posted throughout the semester. Each student will answer the question and then respond to at least 3 posts written by classmates.

Initial reading reflection post: Answer the questions posted by the instructor and connect your answer with the reading materials. It should:

- Fully address the question or prompt posted by the instructor.
- End with one to two questions of your own that you wonder about after doing the readings or writing your responses to the instructor's question(s).

Each post will be around 300 words. The initial posts will be due each Friday 11:59pm Central Time during the assigned week.

Response posts: Please respect your peers and provide your comments on three posts of other students based on the reading materials. Each post will be at least 100 words in length. The comments will be due on each Sunday 11:59pm Central Time during the assigned week.

- All Discussion Posts and in this course should be thorough but succinct, relevant and meaningful to the topic, respectful and understandable.
- All Discussion Posts in this course should connect to and reference the assigned reading materials.

Your grade will be based on completing each of the initial posts and comments and the overall quality of your comments and writing. A rubric of grading can be found in "Assignment Rubrics and Instructions" on WTClass.

• Case Study Assignment (20%)

There will be one case study assignment during the semester. You will choose one organization and conduct the analysis by using the concepts and theories we learned from the reading materials and discussions. Before conducting the case study please send me an email (mxie@wtamu.edu) and get my approval regarding the organization you choose. The organization's analysis will be 3-5 pages, double space, times new roman, 12 pt. font.

The goal of this assignment is to have each student apply the knowledge learned in the class to a real life situation. Students should be succinct but provide enough information to analyze the organization's structure, operation, leadership, etc. Additional details and criteria for the case study assignments will be provided later in the semester.

• Learning Summary (10%)

At the end of the course, you are expected to reflect on and summarize what you have learned in this course. In your summary, you can: discuss your observations about nonprofit management in practice; detail any new insights you have from the course readings and assignments; explain how this course has helped you understand the nature of nonprofit management; and discuss how you envision that the things you've learned during this course may contribute to your future career. Your summary should be 2 page minimum, DOUBLE spaced. Please do not submit this assignment any earlier than a week before its due date as the point is to incorporate and reflect on all the information we reviewed during the course.

• Exams (40%)

Two exams are given to determine understanding of the course material. Exams will cover all aspects of the course such as readings, lectures, videos, handouts, discussions, and any other course materials uploaded to WTClass. The course exams consist of multiple-choice and true-false questions. All students must take all course exams in the week it is posted.

Exam attempts are timed and each student will only get one attempt to complete the exam. Typically, there is plenty of time built into the exam for the student to complete all questions. No make-up exams are allowed unless prior arrangements are made. These exams will assess the

student's knowledge of textbook and lecture material. Please note that exam questions and answers (after submission) will not be returned to the student.

Evaluation

Students should be aware that the instructor grades assignments according to the description in the WTAMU Catalog. An A is reserved for those students that have excelled or mastered the material or activity. A B is reserved for those students that have met all required areas and went beyond them with, perhaps, a few mistakes. A C is reserved for those students that met the required elements of the assignment with appropriate effort and went no further. A D is reserved for those students that almost met all of the required elements of the assignment, but with 3 additional effort would have met them all. Finally, an F is reserved for those students that did not meet the required elements and, obviously did not put forth the required effort.

Every effort is made to make the grading system and rubrics as transparent and fair as possible. You may contest a grade up to one week after it is returned. If you believe that there has been an error on your assignment or exam, please wait 24 hours after receiving the grade. After that period, please submit a written description of the error you believe occurred along with the assignment or exam to the instructor for re-grading. Clerical errors and outright mistakes will be corrected; decisions about the amount of partial credit to give for an answer will not be revisited. Please note that your grade could increase, decrease, or remain the same upon reconsideration.
