Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the sociological examination of emergency management. In the course, students will learn about vulnerability regarding social, economic, political, geographical and cultural factors. Students will investigate how vulnerable groups are affected and cope before, during and after hazardous events.

Vulnerable populations are at particular risk during emergency situations. Disasters strike those most vulnerable with impressive frequency and devastation. Lives lost, injuries sustained, livelihoods disrupted, and properties damaged disproportionately occur among low-income families, lesser-developed nations, the very young and senior citizens, people with disabilities, and racial and ethnic minorities. Yet those same populations contain reservoirs of resilience that remain largely untapped. This course addresses this conundrum and seeks to inspire, from empirical bases of support, to readdress these inequalities. We will learn the common issues these groups face and how those issues may be unique compared to non-vulnerable groups. Why did so many people end up on their roofs after Hurricane Katrina slammed in to the U.S. Gulf Coast? This course will guide us to find answers, to move from personal assumptions regarding how people ended up “there” to the broader social, educational, economic, and even political realities that left few choices among those facing risk.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of the course, you should be able to:

- Understand and define basic concepts such as social vulnerability, social stratification (e.g., gender, race, ethnicity, income, development), resilience, and the disaster life cycle.
- Compare and contrast the dominant paradigm with the vulnerability approach.
- Discuss the role of theory in understanding disasters and impacts generated by social vulnerability.
- Understand why addressing “root causes” for disaster loss reduction results in fewer deaths, injuries, and losses related to livelihoods and properties.
- Explain the concept of sustainable development and its value for reducing vulnerability.
- Define and distinguish between various kinds of communities and the range of ways that communities can (positively and negatively) affect residents within them.
- Be able to conduct a basic community vulnerability assessment.
- Explain and define social change and strategies to empower those at risk in disasters.
- Describe tools, concepts, approaches, and idea that emergency managers can adapt for their community to reduce vulnerability and enhance resilience.

Program Learning Outcomes:

- Students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of how managerial and institutional principles are specially modified for the public-sector and nonprofit environments.
- Students will be able to demonstrate how they define and apply these principles to link emergency management literature.

Course Requirements:

- **Weekly Discussions (60%)**

Students are supposed to read the book chapter before logging on WTClass each week. As a demonstration, students are required to answer discussion questions posted on Discussion Board. Each student will answer the question and then respond to at least 3 posts written by classmates. The discussion posts should

- 1) answer the question
- 2) use arguments/theories in the reading
- 3) be with real-world cases
- 4) be ended with one or two questions for peer students

The first answer is due by **11:59pm on Friday**, while the comments are due the end **following Sunday**. No class discussion will be made up without a prior request approved by the instructor.

- **Exams (40%)**

Two exams are given to determine understanding of the course material. Exams will cover all aspects of the course such as readings, lectures, videos, discussions, and any other course materials uploaded to WTClass. The course exams consist of multiple-choice, true-false and short answer questions. All students must take all course exams in the week it is posted.

Exam attempts are timed and each student will only get one attempt to complete the exam. Typically, there is plenty of time built into the exam for the student to complete all questions. No make-up exams are allowed unless prior arrangements are made. These exams will assess the student’s knowledge of textbook and lecture material.

Evaluation

Students should be aware that the instructor grades assignments according to the description in the WTAMU Catalog. An A is reserved for those students that have excelled or mastered the material or activity. A B is reserved for those students that have met all required areas and went beyond them with, perhaps, a few mistakes. A C is reserved for those students that met the required elements of the assignment with appropriate effort and went no further. A D is reserved for those students that almost met all of the required elements of the assignment, but with additional effort would have met them all. Finally, an F is reserved for those students that did not meet the required elements and, obviously did not put forth the required effort.

Every effort is made to make the grading system and rubrics as transparent and fair as possible. You may contest a grade up to one week after it is returned. If you believe that there has been an error on your assignment or exam, please wait 24 hours after receiving the grade. After that period, please submit a written description of the error you believe occurred along with the assignment or exam to the instructor for re-grading. Clerical errors and outright mistakes will be corrected; decisions about the amount of partial credit to give for an answer will not be revisited. Please note that your grade could increase, decrease, or remain the same upon reconsideration.
