Course Description:

EMA/POSC 4350 is the capstone course for WT’s EMA and PA programs. This capstone course brings learning experiences in the program together to address real-life issues and problems through a major research project. Students select from predefined topical issues, submit a plan for completing the project, and complete a structured research paper. The capstone course will help each student solidify his or her understanding of disasters, and develop the necessary skills and abilities to enter and contribute to the growing emergency management profession.

The course is not lecture-based. In this course, every student will complete a one-term project that will display the student’s mastery of emergency management and public administration facets—administration and management, personnel management, risk management, organizational theory and behavior, finance, economics, administrative law, and public relations. It requires students to link theory, a literature review with their class experiences, pose a research question, analyze the findings, and make recommendations.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of the course, students should gain knowledge to:

- Apply critical thinking and best practices to critical issues in emergency management administration situations
- Demonstrate concepts, principles, standards, and use practices studied in the previous EMA/POSC courses in an applied setting
- Critique and apply best practices in the development of preparation, planning, responding, recovering, and mitigating disasters
- Develop and refine skills sets essential to enter and contribute to the emergency management administration profession

Program Learning Outcomes:

Students are expected to have the knowledge base for higher-level EMA courses and be ready for analytic, critical, and philosophical discussions in the program.

Course Requirements:

- **Research Article Synopsis (40%)**

This course is structured around weekly tasks that involve reading an academic article in the expectation your workload will remain relatively constant throughout the semester. You are encouraged to think about your research topic at the beginning of the semester. Each week you are required to read one academic article and write a summary of the main points in the article. Throughout the semester you will write eight article summaries.

There are eight discussion board questions posted throughout the semester. Each student will answer the question and then respond to at least three posts written by classmates.

- **Research Project (60%)**

For the research project students will identify a predefined topics in Emergency Management or Public Administration that they would like to learn more about. To help you incrementally prepare and submit a research paper, the research project is divided into six activities.

Activity 1: Capstone Topic Selection and Draft of Introduction

Activity 2: Draft of Literature Review and Annotated References

Activity 3: Research Design and Draft of Methodology

Activity 4: Results of the Study

Activity 5: Summary and Discussion

Activity 6: Putting It All Together: Finalizing and Submitting Your Capstone Project, Video Presentation

Evaluation

Students should be aware that the instructor grades assignments according to the description in the WTAMU Catalog. An A is reserved for those students that have excelled or mastered the material or activity. A B is reserved for those students that have met all required areas and went beyond them with, perhaps, a few mistakes. A C is reserved for those students that met the required elements of the assignment with appropriate effort and went no further. A D is reserved for those students that almost met all of the required elements of the assignment, but with 3 additional effort would have met them all. Finally, an F is reserved for those students that did not meet the required elements and, obviously did not put forth the required effort.

Every effort is made to make the grading system and rubrics as transparent and fair as possible. You may contest a grade up to one week after it is returned. If you believe that there has been an error on your assignment or exam, please wait 24 hours after receiving the grade.
